

KROPOTKIN ASKS NO FAVORS

Revolutionist Will Not Petition to
Remain in Switzerland.

GENEVA, June 3.—Prince Kropotkin, the famous Russian writer and revolutionist, who was expelled from Switzerland in 1881 for the "glorification" of the murder of Czar Alexander II., has been permitted by the Federal Government, owing to his failing health, to spend a few months at Locarno.

Several Swiss friends have forwarded a petition to Berne asking that the expulsion order be rescinded. The reply was that the Prince must make application in person. This he refused to do, and, as his time is up, he will return to London within the next few days.
